Special teams make the difference for Tigers

IOWA CITY — Dan Sabers might be spending extra time on special teams in practice next week.

No. 6 Cedar Falls couldn't do anything against Iowa City High's defense, but the Tigers scored touchdowns on a blocked punt and punt return in a 14-0 win over

City last night in a high school football opener at Bates Field.

"We said early on the kicking game was going to play a role," said first-year Cedar Falls Coach Brad Remmert, who won his first game after taking over from longtime coach Pat Mitchell, recently retired.

The Tigers (1-0) managed only 56 yards of offense and 5 first downs.

But Cedar Falls got all the scoring it needed from big special teams plays.

Cedar Falls junior Adrian Diaz blocked and returned a punt 25 yards for a score in the first quarter for a 7-0 lead.

Then, late in the third quarter, Durrell Jackson returned a City punt 74 yards for a score.

Remmert and Tigers set up a wall block that

allowed Jackson to run toward the far sideline. Jackson took care of the rest — darting back toward midfield and breaking a couple of tackles on his way to the end zone.

City missed on two scoring chances in the final two minutes of the first half.

The Little Hawks tackled a Cedar Falls runner near the Tigers' goal line and the head official

raised his arms to signal a safety. He changed the call after conferring with his crew.

After the Cedar Falls ensuing punt, City started at the Tigers' 20-yard line. The Little Hawks couldn't convert a 23-yard field goal try.

Both teams struggled offensively in the first half.

Cedar Falls couldn't move the ball.

The Tigers managed only 27 yards and two first downs, squandering great starting field position.

City couldn't hold onto the ball.

The Little Hawks lost three fumbles and gave up the blocked punt for a score.

"We just have to turn those into points," Remmert said.

West rallies past Kennedy

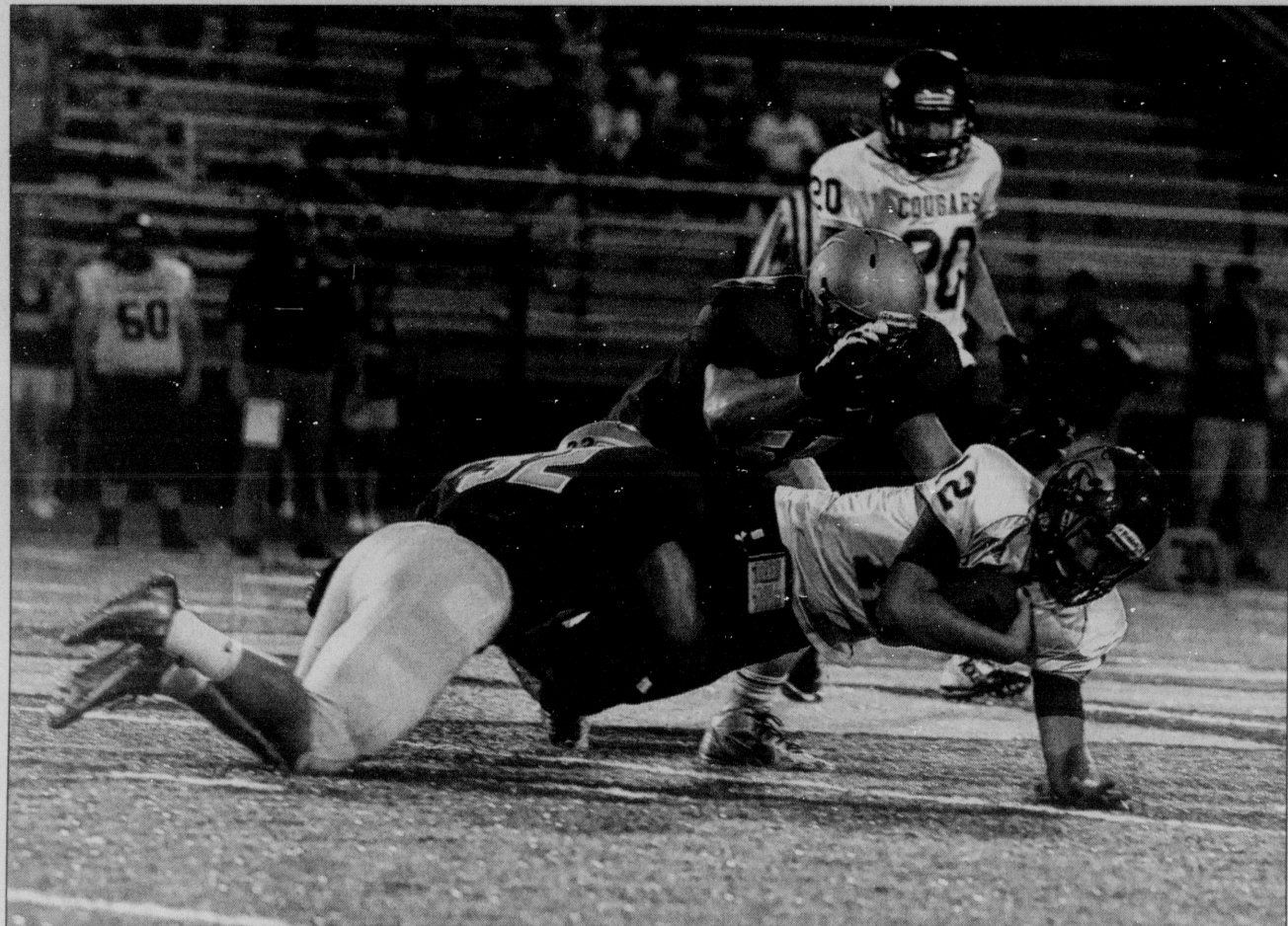
IOWA CITY — Cedar Rapids Kennedy's offensive line dominated the line of scrimmage, but it was Iowa City West that seized the moment last night.

Trailing 9-0 midway through the third quarter with a moribund offense hampered by penalties and turnovers, the Trojans somehow managed to put together two touchdown drives and win the season opener for both teams, 12-9.

The key play was a fourth-and-15 from the Kennedy 33. Kennedy sent a blitz but the Trojan offensive line gave West quarterback Aaron Bleil time to find junior receiver Gabe Huinker in the middle of the field. With the defense spread, Huinker was able to juke his way free and take a serpentine path into the end zone with just 1 minute, 59 seconds left.

The score shocked the large crowd after Kennedy had seemed to be in control with the dominance of its line. Kennedy ground out 178 rushing yards using primarily three runners.

But with the Cougars up 9-0, West responded with a 54-yard drive set up by a nice John Milani kickoff return. The key play in that drive was a

24-yard pass down the sideline to Xavier Koch on a third-and-14.

The winning drive started at the West 27 with only 2:45 left to play. A slant to Koch for 10 and a 15-yard penalty for a personal foul set the Trojans up at the Ken-

nedy 48. They moved it to the 28 but were set back by a procedure penalty. Three incompletions left them with a do-or-die situation. When West's line picked up the blitz that gave Bleil time and Huinker room to maneuver.

The Trojans had trouble moving the ball on the ground but Bleil threw for 187 yards. Oliver Martin caught eight passes for 112 to lead the passing attack.

Kennedy led 6-0 at halftime after two quarters of mishaps. Both

teams threw an interception and lost a fumble. Both had near catastrophic center snap snafus. Kennedy's scoring drive came after a snap sailed over the punter Connor Gordon's head, the second such mistake for West.

Washington outlasts Jefferson, 43-26

CEDAR RAPIDS — Fireworks exploded in the sky over Kingston Stadium last night sandwiched between the production between crosstown rivals on the turf at the stadium.

Fifth-ranked Cedar Rapids Washington had more weapons and more ammunition and posted a 43-26 season-opening win over Cedar Rapids Jefferson that included a late start and a 30-minute delay because of the weather.

The sparks started early but the teams erupted for 41 total points in the third quarter.

Washington led 15-0 at the break. Jefferson pulled within 15-13 on touchdown runs from Tavian Rashed and Jesse Furrow.

The teams exchanged big plays. Washington's Tavian Patrick broke a 70-yard touchdown run that was answered by Jefferson's Manny Olutunde. Johnny

Dobbs helped Washington pull away for his first of two second-half touchdown runs, helping the Warriors to a 16-point lead going into the fourth.

Washington wasted little

time getting on the board. After two short runs and a 15-yard Jefferson penalty, Reid Snitker's first pass hit a wide open Isaiah Nimmers for a 61-yard touchdown, giving the Warriors

a 6-0 lead with 10:48 left in the first.

Nimmers also added a big 44-yard TD reception, catching a short pass, reversing field and bolting for a score to make it 36-20. Nimmers finished with 109 receiving yards.

The Washington defense provided the next blow to the J-Hawks. Nimmers covered a punt, catching it at the 3-yard line, to place Jefferson deep in its own territory. Two plays later, the Warriors sacked quarterback Jesse Furrow for a safety, extending its lead to 8-0 at the beginning of the second.

Special teams followed suit on the ensuing free kick. Landon Akers fielded the kicked, ran to the near sideline and turned the corner, returning it 70 yards for a touchdown. He broke through the coverage, breaking a tackle and outrunning defenders to the end zone.
