Kansas City bullpen shuts down Giants

SAN FRANCISCO — Alcides Escobar ignited a two-run sixth inning with his second hit of the game, and the Kansas City bullpen pitched four hitless innings, propelling the Royals to a 2-1 lead in the World Series with a 3-2 win over the San Francisco Giants last night in Game 3.

Game 4 is scheduled for tonight at AT&T Park.

In running his postsea-

son hitting streak to eight games, Escobar doubled and scored in the first inning, then singled with one out in a two-run sixth that gave the Kansas City pitching staff just enough of a cushion.

Taking over two batters into the sixth inning after the Giants finally cracked Kansas City starter Jeremy Guthrie, the Royals fear-some bullpen foursome of right-hander Kelvin Herrera, lefty Brandon Finnegan, and righties Wade Davis and

Greg Holland squelched a San Francisco comeback bid with near-perfect relief.

Holland was credited with the save after negotiating the heart of the Giants' order — Buster Posey, Pablo Sandoval and Hunter Pence — in the bottom of the ninth.

Guthrie got the win while Giants starter Tim Hudson took the loss.

After the Royals took a 1-0 lead three batters into the game, there was no further scoring until Kansas City

ended Hudson's night in the top of the sixth.

Escobar, who scored the game's first run after a game-opening double, opened the decisive two-run sixth with a single. He came all the way around to score when left fielder Alex Gordon blasted a double to the fence in center field.

Hudson gave way to left-hander Javier Lopez one out later, Eric Hosmer greeted the reliever with an RBI single to make it 3-0.

Linn-Mar wins, 35-21, but Jefferson makes playoffs for first time since '08

MARION — It wasn't the way they necessarily wanted to get it done, but

when the clock hit 0:00 at the end of Friday night, Cedar Rapids Jefferson found itself in the playoffs for the first time since 2008.

The J-Hawks (4-5, 2-3) lost to Linn-Mar, 35-21, but left Marion with a smile. Even if all the goals from before the season weren't met, they got the

biggest one.

"We played these guys tough. We're no longer the team that when people see us on the schedule, they chalk it up as a (win)," Jefferson Coach Brian Webb said. "Whether you're in with a

Kennedy finds offense, postseason berth

CEDAR RAPIDS — They're in.

Yes, at 2-7, the Kennedy Cougars have wedged their way into the postseason. And if history is any reference, they might be a difficult out.

Cedar Rapids Kennedy racked up 453 yards of offense, including 323 from a brutalizing running attack, and downed Waterloo West, 48-28, in a Class 4A District 5 football game last night at Kingston Stadium.

"I had a feeling we'd be able to run the ball, and we did," Kennedy Coach Brian White said. "Now we're 0-0

and we're in the tournament. That's all that matters."

The victory, coupled with Linn-Mar's win over Cedar Rapids Jefferson, vaulted the Cougars (2-7, 2-3) into the No. 3 spot in the 4A-5 pecking order.

Kennedy, Jefferson and Waterloo West all finished 2-3 in the district, but the

Cougars had the best point-spread of the three. Jefferson edged West for the final postseason berth.

The Cougars will play on the road in the first round of the 4A playoffs Wednesday.

"We're ready," said Kennedy's Jay Blank. "We're going to get back to work."

They looked playoff-worthy enough. The stack-I offense, which was the Cougars' bread and butter last season, made a return engagement, and the results were devastating.

"We always had it in the playbook, but we wanted to be more diverse this year," White said. "It was always going to be our goal-line-of-

fense. But I didn't expect our offensive line to progress like it has this year."

Blank ran for 120 yards on nine carries, including a 69-yard touchdown run in the second quarter when he followed the fullback out of the backfield, split a pair of defenders and was off to the races.

"I made a little cutback and ran downfield as fast as I could," he said.

Tyler Dralle was the Cougars' workhorse, carrying the ball 24 times for 110 yards. And the passing game was efficient when called upon. Sammy Lizarraga

Team effort for Saints

CEDAR RAPIDS — Cedar Rapids Xavier's unofficial mantra is that everyone does their job. In the Saints' regular-season finale, they received a little bit from all three units to close with a victory and the Class 3A District 4 title. The run game and special teams put them ahead in the first quarter. The defense and passing game sealed the 37-6 victory over Marion last night at Saints Field. The Saints (6-3, 5-1) roll into their first 3A playoff game by hosting a first-round opponent Wednesday.

"It's nice to win the district," senior running back Jay Kortemeyer said. "Now we have to focus on the playoffs and whoever we play Wednesday."

Kortemeyer ran for 109 of his 142 yards by the break. He was almost the lone option in the opening drive. The Saints drove 65 yards on 11 plays with Kortemeyer getting his hands on the ball for all but a converted fake

punt that kept the drive alive near midfield. He scored on an 8-yard reception from Bryce Schulte to make it 7-0. "I thought our offensive line did well tonight," said Xavier Coach Duane Schulte, praising linemen Sanders Ferring, Ben Fahnle, Louis Hasley, Tim Otting and Joe Constant and tight end Noah Clasen. "We're never happy with

them until we watch the film and have them grade themselves, too. Jay would be the first to give them credit." The special teams padded the lead when Cam Stovie returned a punt 52 yards for a score to make it 13-0. Dallas Klein added a 24-yard field goal for a 16-0 lead. After a miscue on the opening kickoff of the third led to Marion's

only touchdown, the Saints forced their own turnovers. Xavier grabbed two interceptions and recovered a pair of fumbles to break open the game. Sean Murphy picked off a Gage Kray pass and returned it to the Marion 12. Kortemeyer rushed in from the 8 to make it 23-6 in the third.

loss or in with a win, it's been six years." Through 13 minutes of football, it looked like Jefferson may not need a tiebreaker to get in. Spartans grab control with key scoring drive

IOWA CITY — A late second-quarter touchdown gave Pleasant Valley all the momentum it needed to defeat Iowa City West, 38-24, and win a district football championship last night at Trojan Field. The Spartans (6-3) and Trojans (5-4) both head into the 4A playoffs, but the Spartans take the top seed into Wednesday's first-round games. The Trojans had a 21-7 lead late in the second quarter and forced a PV punt. When the Trojans took over on their own 17 with 1:57 left in the half it looked like they were playing with house money. Instead they only gained one yard in three plays while using just 45 seconds before punting back to the Spartans. Collin Banks returned the punt from his own 44 to the West 34, and Pleasant Valley had 62 seconds to work with. Three incompletions and a West offside penalty left PV with fourth and five at the 29. Quarterback Chase Kipper zipped a wide receiver

screen to Kevin Stewart, and he raced all the way into the end zone. "Getting that touchdown and making it only a one-score game, and knowing we were getting the ball after halftime, that gave us a good feeling," Kipper said. "We knew we were coming back and could score on these guys." Suddenly the Spartans trailed 21-14 and were set to receive the third-quarter kickoff. Pleasant Valley drove 78 yards in 12 plays, all on the ground, to tie the game. Brendon Bormann's fourth-down run got a first down by inches at the West 13 to save the drive. The Trojans' offense, so potent in scoring the first three times it had the ball, was stopped cold. The Spartans drove for the go-ahead touchdown on their next possession. They added a field goal on their next possession for a 31-21 lead, which was set up by a fumble recovery deep in West territory. West did finally put together a drive to cut the lead to 31-24 but PV responded with a 91-yard drive to clinch the game.

Muscatine ends City bid for a playoff spot

IOWA CITY — Forget about Iowa City High's defense. Even the dense fog and slippery conditions couldn't slow down Muscatine quarterback Matt Wieskamp. Wieskamp totaled 390 yards and six touchdowns in a wild, 49-42, shootout over Iowa City High in a Class 4A District 5 game at Bates Field. With the loss, the Little Hawks miss the playoffs for the first time since 2002 and only the second time in the last 23 seasons. "We told them if we can't come out here and take care of our field in the final game then we have to live with what it is," City Coach Dan Sabers said. "I'm proud of kids that they kept battling. They kept battling and battling, but it wasn't going to be." City High's Erick Fletcher caught a 12-yard touchdown pass to bring the Little Hawks within 49-42 with 2:34 left. But the ensuing onside kick failed and Muscatine picked up two first downs to run out the clock.

The Muskies (6-3, 3-2) stretched a 29-29 game late in the third quarter into a two-score game with a pair of big plays. On the first play after a City High TD, Wieskamp hit Spencer Beatty for a 68-yard touchdown. The Wieskamp-Beatty duo connected for 164 yards and three scores. Then Muscatine's Isaiah Smith picked off a sideline pass and returned it 38 yards for a score. The Little Hawks couldn't get a stop and ran out of time after that. "That really hurt," Sabers said. "Obviously, we're in a situation where we know maybe we can win if we have the ball last. That one got us two down (possession) and that really hurt." City High's Michael Fredieu rushed for 227 yards and two touchdowns. Quarterback Nate Wieland ran for 161 yards and passed for 125 yards. The Little Hawks (2-7, 2-3) scored touchdowns on their first three drives to build a 21-13 lead, but Muscatine scored nine straight.

Cedar Rapids Washington quarterback Reid Snitker combined for 237 yards total offense and accounted for five touchdowns as the top-ranked Warriors scored a season-high in points in a 63-19 Class 4A District 6 win over Burlington at Bracewell Stadium last night in a football regular-season finale.

The Warriors (9-0, 5-0 District 6) got 143 yards receiving from Alex Herzog and scored the game's first 21 points. Washington piled up 604 yards of offense, and backup quarterback T.J. Vogel threw for 178 yards and a score.
