Last-second kick wins it for Kennedy

MUSCATINE — Teams that finish the regular season with a 2-7 record have no business being anywhere near the state football playoffs.

A lot of people have said that, Brian White heard it. He doesn't care.

"I'll be honest with you," the Cedar Rapids Kennedy Coach said last

night after a 24-yard field goal by Mark Schulz on the final play gave the Cougars a 20-17 Class 4A first-round win over Muscatine. "If you are a 2-7 team that just gets worked every week, you're probably not going to get in. I've heard that a ton. But I got a tweet today from (Activities Director) Aaron Stecker that said 'Iron

sharpens iron.'

"I'll tell you what, the schedule we played this year, we have now played seven of the number one and number two (playoff) seeds on this side of the state. We played a tough schedule, (and) it pays off. These kids have been through it, and they've been hardened because of it."

Schulz missed a field

goal on the final play of regulation that would have beaten Jefferson in September but was money here. Kennedy moved from its 39 to the Muscatine 9 in the final two minutes, calling timeout with one second left.

Muscatine (7-3) tried to ice the left-footer with a timeout of its own, but his kick was right down the middle.

"What a big, big, big difference," Schulz said. "Luckily against Jeff, it was to win the game, not lose the game. I was able to come back in overtime and make one. ... Coach told me that if we ever got into that same situation again, he was going to put me right back in. A game-winning situation just like that, man, it feels great."

Kennedy dominated, outgaining Muscatine, 467-179. Junior Tyler Dralle was the poster boy for the Cougars' ground-and-pound attack with 228 yards rushing on a whopping 46 carries.

"I told our kids all week that this is the kind of script Hollywood writes," White said.

J-Hawks bow out

Season of progress ends for Jefferson in 35-7 loss to second-ranked Bettendorf

BETTENDORF — All Cedar Rapids Jefferson wanted this season was a chance.

A chance to compete, to show opponents it was no longer an automatic win on their schedules, to shake off the demons from the past decade-plus. The J-Hawks got that chance last night, although it didn't go the way they wanted in a 35-7 loss to Class 4A No. 2 Bettendorf.

Their chance ended up being a lesson in what it's going to take to compete at the highest level of Class 4A football, according to their coach.

"The message is it's a step in the right direction," Coach Brian Webb said. "We played a high-caliber opponent. Before Jefferson beats high-caliber opponents, we can't beat ourselves with mistakes, dropped balls and penalties. If we want to compete and beat these teams, we can't beat ourselves.

"My mission now in the off-season is to get all our players and our program at every level to understand the discipline and accountability, that attention to detail that's required to play and compete and beat these teams."

The story of the season was personified in what plagued Jefferson against the Bulldogs.

At least six dropped passes by receivers, two blocked punts and a pair of lost fumbles represent a microcosm of what Webb described as self-inflicted wounds.

There was a scary moment in the third quarter when J-Hawks defensive lineman Caleb Borseth injured his neck. He was placed on a stretcher and taken to a hospital. The junior held a thumb up as he was being wheeled off, and Webb said he was responsive on the field (*more information at thegazette.com when available*).

The Bulldogs had quarterback Jesse Furrow on the run all night and sacking him six times and forcing one fumble that was returned 31 yards for a Bettendorf touchdown.

The senior QB had high goals for this team in his only year at Jefferson (4-6), and though they didn't accomplish every one he said he learned a lot about himself and the team.

"The way we came together (was special)," Furrow said.

Koch sparkles in West victory

IOWA CITY — Steam rose off Iowa City West receiver Xavier Koch as he answered questions after West's 28-0 victory over Ottumwa last night in a Class 4A first-round playoff game. The evening was cold, but Koch was that hot.

The Trojan senior scored three second-quarter touchdowns, each more spectacular than the last, to give the home team a 21-0 halftime lead and all but clinch the victory.

Koch caught a pass in the corner of the end zone on third-and-goal from the 20 with 7:07 left in the half.

"Aaron (Bleil) threw a perfect ball," Koch said. "I just reached for it and I got it."

Later, West put together a 2-minute drill and moved from its 19 to the Bulldog 38. But a sack moved the ball back to the 49 for a fourth-and-15 play. Bleil fired the ball down the middle to Koch for a TD with 39 seconds left.

"It was a post; I faked to the corner and just went deep," Koch said. "It was a perfect ball again."

"They brought two

guys up on our short routes," Bleil said.

"They only had one guy back on Xavier on the deep, and he beat the guy and all I had to do was throw it up."

Bleil was sharp all night and threw for 230 yards.

Ottumwa connected on a long pass and threatened to score in the waning seconds but had to settle for a 35-yard field-goal attempt. When the ball was blocked it went to Koch.

"I just looked up in the air and got it," he said. "Everyone was screaming 'go, go, go,' so I just ran as fast as I could. My teammates were there to block. John Milani had a couple key blocks at the end."

He followed his teammates 80 yards along the sideline, pausing at just the right times to allow blockers to pick off pursuers.

Koch wasn't tackled until he reached the goal line as time expired. The officials conferred and ruled it a touchdown.

"I just reached when I got to the end zone," Koch said. "I was a little worried because I was going to be mad if we didn't get that."

2 kickoff returns lift Spartans, 38-20

SOLON — Nothing special and nothing fancy.

The Solon Spartans' kickoff return success came down to this:

"Those guys are just athletes," Solon Coach Kevin Miller said.

Brandon Kramer returned the opening kickoff 88 yards for a touchdown, and Connor Ham added a 77-yard scoring return as third-ranked Solon downed Davenport Assumption, 38-20, in a Class 3A first-round playoff game last night at Spartan Stadium.

The Spartans (9-1) held Assumption to 20 second-half yards after a first-half shootout. They'll play in Monday's second round, against an opponent not yet determined at press time.

Kramer took the opening kick at the 12-yard line and went straight up the middle of the field, untouched.

"I saw all that green in front of me, so I just ran through it," he said. "I was just hoping nobody would catch me. It was awesome."

Assumption (5-5) matched the Spartans most of the first half be-

hind its passing game. Joe Argo completed 15-of-20 passes for 205 yards before halftime, hitting on three touchdowns. But the Spartans blocked the PAT attempt after the third touchdown.

Then it was Ham's turn.

The track and field star got around the left corner and outran everybody for a 28-20 lead that stood at halftime.

"We came back out (after halftime) with the mentality to be more physical, and that's exactly what we did," Kramer said.

Assumption Coach Wade King said, "Early on, we took what they gave us. But it doesn't mean much if we can't take care of the kicking game. They made some good adjustments, and we didn't have an answer for that."

In addition to his big start, Kramer added 132 rushing yards on 23 carries. Ham ran for 57 yards with two scores.

Brandon Childs had a 30-yard field goal in the fourth quarter, then Nathaniel Christensen capped the scoring with a 3-yard TD run with 3:42 to go.

Lisbon shakes off iffy start, rolls to first-round win

LISBON — The opening kick nearly spelled disaster for Lisbon in its opening-round victory last night over Lone Tree.

Lisbon's Ryan Light shot up the middle and looked poised for a big return. Then the ball tumbled out of his hands and landed at the Lisbon 40-yard line. Lone Tree and Lisbon players piled on the ball, but Lisbon retained possession and

eventually cruised to a 40-0 victory.

"We had a fake reverse on," said Lisbon Coach Kent Allison. "I'm thinking it's going pretty well, he's right in the middle of the field, then the ball squirts out of his hands. But our kids hustled."

The ball continued to bounce toward Lisbon. Two early scores put Lisbon in the driver's seat, and the Lions played keep away from Lone Tree most of the

first half. Lisbon ran 36 offensive plays to Lone Tree's 18.

"Our running game was decent," Allison said. "Our play-action pass helped to soften them up a little bit, then we'd hit them some more."

Lisbon scored less than three minutes into the first quarter. Light, listed as a wide receiver, lined up under center and scored on an 8-yard scramble. Four minutes later, Brock

Givens connected on a 17-yard touchdown pass to Hunter Robinson. Lisbon kept that drive alive with Light's run for 6 yards and a first down on a fake punt on fourth-and-5.

"The fake was supposed to be a throw," Light said. "That got blown up, and I saw the window and I just went for it."

A pair of Benton Frey touchdowns in the second quarter gave Lisbon a 28-0 halftime lead.
